
Heavenly King,

Ask, Knock, Seek


Mt 7:7-12

- Continual action implied
- God does not need to be convinced or nagged into a response.
- We persist because God has promised to answer. It's a matter of time.



Every good father gives what is best

- Earthy fathers will not refuse their children the things they need
- ☐ How much greater is our Heavenly Father – he will not refuse to give what we need
- God always answers in His way, at the right time
- God gives what is best
- Life examples?



What do we need?

- Food, shelter, work, friendship, community, security, health, peace, joy, strength and consolation
- To pray for the needs of others
- Prayer, meditation, reflection, Holy Scripture, Eucharist – the Bread of Life
- Need a relationship with God
- The greatest gift of persistent prayer is GOD HIMSELF



The Golden Rule

"So whatever you wish that men would do to you, do so to them; for this is the law and the prophets" (Mt 7:12)

While normally a negative statement (based upon not doing to others), Jesus states it positively



"Do not do to others what you would not like yourself. Then there will be no resentment against you, either in the family or in the state."


"Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful."

"This is the sum of duty; do naught onto others what you would not have them do unto you."

"No one of you is a believer until he desires for his brother that which he desires for himself."

"What is hateful to you, do not do to your fellowman. This is the entire Law; all the rest is commentary."

"Regard your neighbor's gain as your gain, and your neighbor's loss as your own loss."



The Narrow Gate

- Matthew 7:13-14
- ☐ Cities surrounded by walls
- Main Gates large and wide; with a wide road (level and smooth) leading up to them; used by merchants, travellers with animals and carts, the reach and wealthy
- Narrow Gates for pedestrians an poor; roads leading up the them narrow and difficult (up and down)
- Most people used main road and gates easier
- ☐ What is Jesus trying to say?




Enter by the narrow gate


- "ENTER" is an invitation. Jesus is inviting us into His kingdom.
- ☐ However, the road is difficult and the entrance is narrow. What is Jesus speaking about?
- The road of discipleship is not easy. Requires self-denial and carrying the cross. (See Mt 16:24). Need to be free from attachments.



- ☐ The narrow gate is the gate of repentance, death and resurrection...
- Not possible for us to enter on our own. Holy Spirit makes it possible...
- Jesus said, "For men this is impossible, but for God all things are possible" (Mt 19:26)
- ☐ Jesus is the Gate Crucified and Risen from the Dead
- In Baptism united to his death, resurrection and ascension








The wide road and gate

- Easy Road no self-denial required; no rules and restrictions; wealth and possessions; leisure and pleasure; power and prestige
- Wide Gate Death without repentance and without God
- ☐ Final Destination Hell and eternal damnation
