

The Shroud of Turin: Discover the facts about the most studied artifact in Christendom.

DESCRIPTION:

The presentation on the Shroud of Turin will feature the exposition of an official full size photographic replica on cotton cloth which has been produced under the authority of the Archdiocese of Turin, Italy. It has been gifted to Bishop David from the Archbishop of Turin. As well, four half Shroud upright displays will also be available for viewing.

With the help of a PowerPoint presentation, we will examine the most intriguing and amazing characteristics of the Shroud of Turin, many of which can be discerned and appreciated only in our time because of advances in science and technology. Aided by our scientific knowledge and the history of Church art, we will trace the most probable historical journey of the Shroud from the tomb of Christ to the city of Turin in Italy.

We will address these important questions:

- What have we learned from science about the authenticity of the cloth?
- Is there any reason to think it has been elsewhere other than Europe in its history?
- Are there any connections between church prayers or art with the Shroud of Turin?
- Are there any other religious artifacts that shed light on the Shroud of Turin?
- If it is real, what does that mean for our faith?
